

NACD's 67th Stewardship Week will be held April 24 – May 1, 2022 with the theme "Healthy Soil: Healthy Life."

Each spring, NACD and thousands of dedicated conservationists organize a multitude of outreach events and educational learning experiences for students and adults in order to increase awareness about the importance of natural resource conservation. Coin Toss Easter Game

This is a fun **Easter game** from my childhood. Me and my grandfather would play this game over and over again.

I do not know if this is something he came up or picked from someone though but either way but I thought it was really awesome and couldn't wait to play (for more than one reason).

We never had plastic Easter eggs, truth be told I don't even know if you could buy them at our local stores at that time, so we always made more than one batch of colored eggs.

One batch was always for the "show" – they were the ones that were displayed and were usually the ones that turned out the best.

These were not meant for eating as they would be displayed for days (these are also the ones that we used to play this game).

Other batches were made for eating and gifting as they had the freshness element the "show" ones lacked.

How to Play Coin Toss Easter Game

To play this Easter game you'll need hard boiled, colored Easter eggs – preferably ones that can't be eaten any more (no need to waste good eggs).

You could also get away with Styrofoam eggs although the game will be a bit harder.

Lots of coins – cents, dollars (Euros or any other currency naturally).

Basket to put the eggs in.

Place a few eggs in the basket (one is enough really) – there still has to be lots of room in the basket

Decide on the distance from where the game will be played (we usually use some duct tape to mark the standing point).

Taking turns players throw the coins towards the basket – aiming at the egg.

If a player manages to hit the egg so that the coin hits the egg and stays in the egg (not bounces away or misses it) the player gets to take all the coins that are in (and around) the basket. This Easter game is great for hand eye coordination, vision motor skills and as there's an awesome reward if you win (which I did a lot – thanks' to my grandfather who was a master of letting me win without me knowing I was let to win).

Easter Bunny Paper Plate Craft

What you'll need to make the paper plate Easter Bunny:

-Construction Paper, Pom Poms, Pipe Cleaners, Googly Eyes, Small Paper Plates, Extreme Elmer Glue. These are pretty simple to do and are a perfect Easter craft for your toddler to do because of the simplicity! **For the nose:** take 3 pipe cleaners and twist them around each other in the center so that they are connected/stuck together. The part you twist is the hidden part that will go under the nose (pom poms) and will be hidden. This will leave you with the whiskers sticking out on both sides. Then glue to the paper plate. Leave time to let dry as this step will require it to be glued well or the pipe cleaners will fall off. You can also glue with hot glue (which will stay better) but make sure adults do this part and then let the kids glue the pom poms on once the hot glue has dried and cooled. Once glue is dry from the pipe cleaners, now glue on

your nose (pom poms). For the ears: Really all you need to do is cut out some ears from white construction paper and then cut out a smaller inside ear with a different color. We chose pink and yellow. For the eyes: We used googly eyes and just glued them on but you could also use construction paper and make the eyes yourself. For the mouth: We simply just drew on the mouth with a black marker. That's it! We hope you have fun making this simple and easy Easter Bunny craft for kids!









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Recipe Spot . . .

Chocolate-Dipped Ice Cream Cone Cupcakes

Ingredients:

1 Package French Vanilla or yellow cake mix (regular size) 24 Ice Cream Cake Cones (about 3 inches tall) 1/4 cup 2% milk 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Frosting:

1 cup butter, softened 1/2 cup shortening 6 cups confectioners' sugar **Glaze:**

4 cups semisweet chocolate chips 1/4 cup shortening colored sprinkles

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°. Grease 24 mini-muffin cups. Stand ice cream cones in additional mini-muffin cups.
- 2. Prepare cake mix batter according to package directions. Fill each greased muffin cup with 1 tablespoon batter. Divide remaining batter among ice cream cones (scant 2 tablespoons each).
- 3. Bake until a knife inserted in center comes out clean, 15-20 minutes. Cool in pans 5 minutes. Transfer both plain and cone cupcakes to wire racks; cool completely.
- 4. For frosting, beat butter and shortening until blended. Gradually beat in confectioners' sugar, milk and vanilla on medium speed until soft peaks form.
- To assemble, spread a small amount of frosting on bottom of each plain cupcake; attach to top of a cone cupcake. Spread remaining frosting over top cupcakes, rounding tops to resemble a scoop of ice cream. Freeze until frosting is firm, 5-10 minutes.
